Our Friends - Eastern Idaho Story

With a focus on improving the well-being of Idaho's children, key state and local stakeholders and community leaders supported bringing the Friends of the Children model to Idaho in 2023. To launch our new chapter, one million dollars in seed capital funding was raised from a diverse funding base.

The need in our community is great. 51% of American Falls households and 46% of Pocatello households live below the ALICE threshold (2022 United Way Report). Only 51% of Idaho students arrive at school ready to learn to read, which is last in the United States. Our program works to break these cycles of generational poverty and provide youth and families with opportunities to thrive.

Research shows that a consistent, supportive relationship with a caring adult is the single-most important factor in shaping a child's future - and can mitigate childhood adversity and trauma. Our unique program works to do just that:

- We intentionally serve the children in our community facing the greatest obstacles.
- We employ and train salaried, Professional mentors called Friends.
- We commit for the long term. 12+ years, no matter what.
- We work closely with parents and caregivers and in all facets of a child's life.

OUR LONG-TERM OUTCOMES

Because Friends - Eastern Idaho part of a national network with more than 30 years of proven results, we know our professional mentoring model works. For three decades, our model has been breaking cycles of poverty and getting results for youth.

For example, of youth enrolled in Friends of the Children who have experienced foster care:





92% enroll in postsecondary education, serve our country or enter the workforce.



83% graduate high school



93% avoid juvenile iustice



98% avoid early parenting

Compared to youth who experienced foster care without a Friend: 55% 74% 74%



When Ricky* started school, he struggled to hold a pencil. His letters didn't look "just right," and his frustration grew with each attempt. Ricky was at risk of falling further behind, of being another child whose potential goes unrealized.

But something was different for Ricky. Because of you, he had Eduardo. Eduardo is Ricky's professional mentor (his "Friend") who walks alongside him four hours each week. Eduardo approached this learning challenge with consistent reassurance and creative, hands-on learning. Instead of falling behind, Ricky discovered that letters come in many shapes and forms. He built them out of toothpicks and gumdrops. He shaped them from clay. He practiced with encouragement and without judgment.

The four hours each week Eduardo spends with Ricky are funded by you. You provided the toothpicks, gumdrops, clay, pencil grips, and treats along the way. And by year's end, Ricky not only did he have some of the best handwriting in the class, his confidence had soared.

This fall, Ricky headed back to school knowing that whatever new challenges arise, Eduardo will be there. Not just this year, but for 12+ years, no matter what.

We are grateful for the generous hearts that provide Ricky and children like him with the support to thrive rather than just survive. You empower them to break cycles that have trapped their families for generations, and together, we will keep working until every child in Eastern Idaho who needs a Friend has one by their side. *Youth name changed to protect privacy.

Caregivers responded with an average score of 9 out of 10 when asked whether their child's Friend is positively impacting the family home and helping them better understand their child and their needs.




During engineering activities at our summer STEM camp, a young girl named Dolly* began to get very frustrated. She didn't quite know how to ask for help. Then she said she didn't want any help. She said she didn't want to do anything. She went and sat on the bench, very frustrated and disengaged from the activity and the learning opportunity it presented.

Thanks to your generosity, Chelsae (her professional mentor, or "Friend") was there. She came over to Dolly calmly and said, "Your behavior shows me that you need something. Maybe something to drink and some time to calm down?" She offered different options, observing and connecting with Dolly's reactions. When Dolly eventually asked for some chocolate milk, it only took a moment or two for her to be ready to re-engage with the activity, picking up where she had left off. Later, when things started to get challenging again for her, Dolly immediately left the table and walked over towards Chelsae. After a minute or two of being next to her Friend, Dolly was able to return to her place at the table and complete the project, ultimately expressing her pride in her finished creation.

This is a beautiful example of the impact of your investment in these children. Dolly is learning to lean on her Friend when she needs co-regulation and learning what works for her body. It also showed the strength a Friend provides just by being there, day in and day out, providing patience, understanding, and acceptance. The model of supportive mentorship you make possible empowers these young children to learn the tools they need to be successful, whether building a model car or eventually building a career or a family. *Youth name changed to protect privacy.
