HISTORY OF FRIENDS TAMPA BAY



2014

- Friends Tampa Bay launches as an affiliate of a local lead agency providing foster care services due to the alarming number of youth in care in Hillsborough, Pinellas and Pasco counties.
- 8 Friends began serving our first cohorts of 64 children with open dependency cases.

2018

▶ Friends Tampa Bay made the strategic decision to launch a stand-alone chapter to allow the organization to operate independently and increase the number of children served in the Tampa Bay area.

2020

- Despite challenges posed by the COVID-19 pandemic, remote services continued.
- A new cohort was added in partnership with Hillsborough County Schools at Foster Elementary.

2024

- Our first cohort of youth reached the 10-year milestone with our program.
- A new cohort was added in partnership with Pinellas County Schools at Lealman Elementary.

ABOUT US

Friends of the Children–Tampa Bay is part of a national network of Friends of the Children chapters across the United States. Friends of the Children connects children – all of whom have unique talents – to a paid, professional mentor called a Friend. We hire and train Friends whose full-time jobs are to support our youth to succeed, despite the extremely challenging situations most experience, from as early as age 4 through high school graduation – 12+ years, no matter what.

Our model is distinct, courageous and proven. We redefined youth mentoring by creating the first and only long-term professional mentoring program in the



country. Friends are experts in building sustained and nurturing relationships with youth. Our model is evidence-informed and research-based, and we have proven long-term outcomes to show it works.

This is at the core of what we do. Each day, our Friends advocate and help amplify the voices of our youth and their families who often become voiceless in the midst of the systemic failures. By challenging the status quo, we also help shift the way institutions and systems view and treat our youth and their families. Friends also create meaningful experiences that teach youth to build life skills and make informed decisions while exploring the child's diverse talents and interests.

Our model is unique, and it works.

Our values guide us to achieve our mission. Each value applies not only to our youth, Friends and program teams, but also applies to all Friends of the Children employees, volunteers and partners. 



Youth Statistics

In 2024, we served **59 youth**—27 in elementary school and 32 in high school.



We serve youth across **three counties** and collaborate with Pinellas and Hillsborough County Schools to identify new cohorts.



In 2024, our paid professional mentors devoted **11,500** hours to supporting youth and shaping a brighter future.

Each Friend dedicates an average of 4-6 hours per week, year-round, to each youth, providing consistent and meaningful support.

We call our professional mentors Friends because they go beyond a job—they form lasting, meaningful relationships with youth. These Friends empower and support youth by advocating for their academic success, encouraging exploration of new interests, and connecting them to life-changing opportunities.

They provide emotional support, teach coping skills, and offer the stability of a consistent adult presence. For over 12+ years, no matter what, every youth in our program has had a Friend dedicated to spending 4 hours a week helping them navigate life's challenges and reach their full potential.

Every child, no matter who they are or where they live, has dreams of doing big things. They have unique talents, and they face obstacles—sometimes, a lot more obstacles. Any child in any situation can succeed, even those facing the most obstacles. Our youth go on to become leaders in their communities and successful in their careers. This has ripple effects on their siblings, peers, neighbors, and their children, breaking the cycle of generational poverty.

KEN & DONOVAN



Donovan's journey with Friends of the Children-Tampa Bay is a testament to resilience and the profound impact of mentorship.

Introduced to the program at age 5, Donovan faced immense challenges early in life, growing up without knowing his parents and losing vision in one eye as a baby. After being taken in by his grandmother, Donovan met his Friend, Ken Baker, who would become a steadfast source of guidance and encouragement.

Tragically, a year later, Donovan's grandmother passed away in a car accident, leaving him and his sister in the care of their young aunt, whom they call "Titi," who was just starting her own life in college.

Through these hardships, Ken remained a constant in Donovan's life, providing stability and support. Ken's mentorship inspired Donovan's passion for fitness and athletics, encouraging him to explore weight training and later wrestling. Visits to Gold's Gym with Ken ignited Donovan's determination to "get swole," and his dedication caught the attention of Pasco High School's wrestling coach. Donovan never missed a practice, advanced to Regionals in the 106-pound weight class as a freshman, and now, as a junior, has set his sights on becoming first in State in the 126-pound weight class. His love for wrestling, coupled with his commitment to academics, consistently earning Honor Roll with a goal of straight A's, showcases his relentless drive to succeed.



Donovan's aspirations extend beyond high school. He dreams of attending college, possibly majoring in Psychology, and one day becoming a mentor for Friends of the Children to give back and inspire other kids facing adversity. His story exemplifies the transformative power of consistent, long-term mentorship. Ken's unwavering support has

helped Donovan overcome immense obstacles, build resilience, and believe in a brighter future. Together, they demonstrate the heart of Friends of the Children's mission:

empowering youth to achieve greatness through enduring relationships grounded in trust, love, and encouragement.

Delanie's Growth: Delanie's journey illustrates the profound impact of fostering self-awareness, self-management, and self-determination. During an outing to the Nature Center, Delanie's Friend encouraged her to embrace challenges, and she responded with a maturity that showcased her emotional growth. This experience highlights how exposure to new environments, paired with mentorship, allows children to develop resilience and an appreciation for nature while reinforcing life skills that will help them succeed in the future.

EDUCATION



LJ's Transformation: LJ started in the program as a second grader struggling with math and confidence. Over time, with the consistent support of his Friend, LJ not only excelled academically but also learned essential coping strategies to manage stress and frustration. His growth in both his math and spelling skills exemplifies the power of long-term mentoring, helping him gain the self-assurance to thrive in his academic environment.

Alicia's Academic Journey: Virtual schooling presented many challenges for Alicia, but with the guidance of her Friend, she set goals to return to in-person learning. Alicia's perseverance paid off as she began to see progress not just academically but also in her social behavior. By the end of the school year, Alicia had significantly improved her attendance, engagement, and academic performance, proving that her determination, combined with a Friend's consistent support, could overcome even the toughest barriers.



THE A, B, C, Ds OF SCHOOL SUCCESS AND OPPORTUNITY

Through 1:1 support, Friends are bridgebuilders to school success. They focus on key indicators of school engagement for every child: **Attendance**, **Behavior** and **Course Progression**. They also remove barriers and provide tangible support for youth to **Dream and Plan for their Futures**.



ATTENDANCE

- Friends foster belonging, safety, and motivation to stay in school.
- Friends help caregivers access community resources and mitigate barriers to school attendance.
- Friends work with school professionals to create personalized learning strategies for each youth.



BEHAVIOR

- Friends support identity development, promote youth voice, and build skills including selfregulation, problem-solving, and critical thinking.
- Friends work in classrooms, helping youth positively engage within the school environment.
- Friends promote positive peer development, connect youth to extracurricular activities, and integrate learning into peer-based outings.



COURSE PROGRESSION

- Friends work in and outside the classroom with youth and education specialists to advance proven trauma-informed strategies for literacy.
- Friends support caregivers to positively engage in their child's learning process.
- Friends communicate with teachers and staff to ensure youth have needed services including special education and mental health resources.



DREAM AND PLAN FOR THE FUTURE

- Friends provide youth opportunities for volunteering, career path exploration, college preparedness, employment opportunities, and military options.
- Friends work with youth to strive for the futures they envision, supporting them to apply for colleges and scholarships, build resumes, prepare for interviews anything needed to advance their personal goals.

OUR MODEL

We work with partners to identify families along the child and family well-being continuum to ensure that our model is serving the children and families who need us most.





Malachi's story is one of resilience, determination, and the transformative power of mentorship. From a young age, he faced the instability of foster care, moving between group homes and navigating challenges that could have easily derailed his potential. Yet, with the unwavering support of his Friend and Friend, Greg, through Friends of the Children–Tampa Bay, Malachi has not only persevered but thrived.

Greg's journey with Malachi began before their official mentorship. As a teacher's and bus assistant at Southern Oak Elementary, Greg's first task each morning was helping five-year-old Malachi into his harness in the front seat, sitting with him to ensure he arrived safely. Their bond grew in the classroom, where Greg often helped Malachi calm down or complete tasks.

Years later, when Greg joined Friends of the Children, he had the opportunity to select the final youth on his roster. Scrolling through a long list of children in foster care, he saw a familiar name—Malachi. In that moment, their story had a brand-new beginning.

Since then, Greg has been a steady presence in Malachi's life, building a relationship rooted in trust and shared passions. Despite frequent moves, Malachi has maintained all A's and B's, demonstrating remarkable academic achievement. Greg has also nurtured Malachi's creativity and confidence by introducing him to DJ'ing—a shared passion that has become a meaningful outlet. Practicing together twice a month, they have bonded over the craft, and last Christmas, Greg gifted Malachi a DJ board to encourage his growth.

- 46% of our youth live with an adoptive or non-biological parent.
- There are approximately6,000 youth in foster care.

That encouragement paid off. Malachi's dedication and talent recently led to an exciting milestone—his first DJ gig at his new group home. Beyond music, he has embraced new challenges, joining his first organized basketball season at the YMCA. In his debut game, he scored six points, grabbed multiple rebounds, and helped his team secure a 35-33 victory.

Greg's commitment to Malachi embodies the heart of Friends of the Children's mission: providing long-term, stable mentorship to youth facing significant obstacles and empowering them to achieve their goals. Through Greg's guidance and the program's consistent support, Malachi continues to break barriers and build a future full of promise. His journey is a testament to the power of mentorship, proving that with resilience, encouragement, and opportunity, even the most daunting challenges can be overcome.

In partnership with Frameworks, we also facilitated a family-focused social and emotional learning activity, fostering connection and growth. With 110 youth, caregivers, and family members in attendance, it was a meaningful way to recognize achievements and strengthen our community.

Kind Mouse supports our families by providing fresh and canned food, which we deliver weekly, ensuring barriers to food insecurity are removed.




The Ryan Nece Foundation's Student Service Leaders offer literacy and math tutoring sessions, incorporating fun activities to make learning engaging.


